* (based on emerging data. Other studies, from several yearly meetings, also exist. This is based on interviews with 15 Friends over time.)




Have a significant chunk of **welcomers** inside the group.

(So if you're a large meeting, you need more people out there being friendly & curious).



Have **translators and encouragers** who can talk about Quaker practices one-on-one.



Have **intergenerational time** that is just **social** without a specific structure that people need to follow. People from welcoming meetings find it very easy to join the social life inside the group.



Invite **questions** and new learning for **all**. Provide a space where people who are unsure can ask questions about gender identity, or antiracism work, with their curiosity brought to a safe space.



Be Open and willing to change.

(Does the time of your committees work for parents? Are people finding the spiritual nurture that they crave?)



Be teachable and also willing to learn.

(New attenders at your meeting, no matter what their age, can lead a workshop on something that they're passionate about.)



Offer leadership roles for younger people!

(serving on weighty committees, hosting coffee hour, teaching what they know about antiracism work, etc.)
